

CAMPUS 60 - TALLINN UNIVERSITY OF TECHNOLOGY ON THE DUNES OF MUSTAMÄE

The exhibition "Campus 60 - Tallinn University of Technology on the dunes of Mustamäe" celebrates the University of Technology's arrival to Mustamäe, being the first inhabitant of the district on the undeveloped sand dunes. It marks the journey of the Technical University from 1918 to the re-independence of the 1990s. The University of Technology could have been located in the city center, in Juhkentali, Kopli, Hiiu or Pirita. In the end, however, they reached Mustamäe, where they stayed.

The exhibition offers a comprehensive overview of the development of Tallinn University of Technology's academic environment in Mustamäe. It pays homage to the architects and engineers who designed their own school in the 1960s. In the lobby of the main building, projects and interior design elements of this decade are presented, including Enn Põldroos's mosaic panel "Youth". There are also other surprises in the lobby that show the original details in the academic buildings. In addition, unrealized plans and visions, such as the university's large fountain, have also been highlighted.

The hall of Tallinn University of Technology together with the bank auditorium is a top engineering achievement of the 1960s, and its acoustics were considered one of the best in Estonia at the time. For example, in addition to conferences and assemblies, many major events of Estonian music have taken place in the university hall, from the world premiere of Arvo Pärt's "Tabula Rasa" to jazz-rock concerts, not to mention footage from the movie Men Don't Cry.

The exhibition's chief curator and architectural historian Epi Tohvri invites you to the exhibition, which is open until the end of December, confirming: "The Mustamäe university campus is an Anglo-American type academic campus, which is still one of the best and most complete learning environments in Estonia. The main feature of the campus is a complete university complex planned on a beautiful natural site on the edge of the city. Student dormitories, sports facilities and other leisure facilities are also planned for the campus. The campus is like an academic village, where a strong sense of togetherness and connection between the learning atmosphere and the natural environment is created."

We welcome all architecture enthusiasts.
